

While many of the targets in Rebuilding Ireland are being met, the number of people who are homeless continues to rise to new record levels. While there are different judgements about what has been achieved so far, there is unanimous agreement that we need to do more. RBI's targets for new social housing delivery become increasingly challenging in the coming years and there are questions as to whether the targets were ever adequate given the scale of the challenge.

his National Conference will take this opportunity to identify the main barriers which are blocking or delaying progress, and to put forward ideas as to how they can be overcome.

The conference will kick off with a keynote address from broadcaster, journalist and economist, David McWilliams who will, in his challenging and engaging style, set out the overarching challenges which face us as a society and an economy.

The next session will address the complex question of how we plan and build sustainable and vibrant communities. RBI seeks to 'learn the lessons of the past' by avoiding building large-scale single tenure estates. But relying on small scale developments creates significant burdens of financing, planning, cost and delivery. What are the real lessons from the past? Can we build homes on the necessary scale while building communities too? **Professor Michelle Norris** of UCD will draw on years of experience and

research on what makes communities viable, and the debate will be deepened by **John Boughton**, author of recently published 'Municipal Dreams', which the Guardian described as 'arguing passionately for safe and secure public housing for all who need it'.

The second session will explore the way in which our land management and planning processes may be slowing down the delivery of new houses and making homes unaffordable. Prof Rory O'Donnell will build on the challenging and radical analysis of recent NESC reports on the issue, while AnnMarie Farrelly will bring her practical experience as Director of Planning in the fastest growing council in Ireland, Fingal County Council. Dr Brendan O'Sullivan of UCC will draw on his professional experience and research to critically address our planning processes and whether they support or hinder the task of solving the housing and homelessness crisis.

Ending Homelessness: Overcoming the Barriers



For the last few years we have been tackling the housing crisis in a world with low interest rates, low labour costs but a shortage of capital. Over the next period there will be very different challenges – rising interest rates, shortage of skilled building labour and anxiety that building 30,000 houses a year will over-heat the economy. Dr Seamus Coffey, Chair of the Government's Fiscal Advisory

Council will outline the challenges and choices that will confront us as we face into this even more difficult world.
